

Life in rural Latino communities

Food insecurity is defined as having inconsistent access to adequate food at some point in the year due to a lack of resources for food.

Over **38 million** people in the U.S. were living in food insecure households in 2020.

Hispanic/Latino households made up **17%** of households.

Are at increased risk to food insecurity due to:

- Limited employment
- Geographic location
- Financial instability

Barriers to accessing and consuming healthful foods.

Policy Recommendations

Improving food security and food access for all Latinos.

- Currently there is a lack of food retailers in rural areas and this is a significant challenge to advancing food security among rural Latinos.
- Policies must focus on improving food access and affordability in rural areas.

Increasing access and enrollment to federal nutrition assistance programs.

 Policies must be directed at improving access to enrollment in federal nutrition programs for immigrant and rural communities. Improving food access and addressing barriers due to the built environment.

- Those living in rural communities may lack transportation to access services.
- Funding should be invested in improving the walkability of rural neighborhoods to promote access to local grocery stores and food services, and improve infrastructure (i.e., internet access and digital literacy education).

Strenghtening funding allocation to improve food security outcomes.

 Adequate and continuous funding should be made available through grants for organizations serving communities.

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
